- Ensure our children are exposed to a variety of creative experiences within and outside of school nurturing open, imaginative and innovative thought.
- Invite in Artists from diverse backgrounds to inspire the inner artist in every child exciting them to explore art in its many forms both within and outside the school environment creating exceptional outcomes, which we celebrate.
- Ensure that pupils are given the opportunity to explore their art skills building on what was taught prior- enhanced through an rich and vibrant curriculum full of exceptional experiences.
- Ensure that staff make purposeful links to Art & Design and Mental Health and Well-Being using this area as a tool for relaxation and self-regulation.
- Reassure pupils and make them aware that developing artistic skills takes time and practice, making links with the school's growth mind-set approach.
  - Fundamentally, we want to enable all our pupils to see that, Art and DT are developing a variety of life skills in them; whilst underpinning and consolidating their well-being.
